Creating Parks and Open Space: A Community Effort

In East Boston, the movement for new open space has been growing since the 1960s, when a half-century of concentrated transportation and industrial development resulted in the destruction of 45-acre Wood Island Park. Razing this Olmsted-designed park provided the airport with room to expand, but left the East Boston community with limited local open space. Since then, East Boston citizens have lobbied for the creation of Belle Isle Marsh Reservation and Piers Park, respectively, transforming an abandoned drive-in and unused waterfront property into first-rate recreation areas. Citizens continued to press for creation of 1.5 miles of the East Boston Greenway, the Harborwalk, Navy Fuel Pier, and Bremen Street Park, which in June 2007 was the biggest park to open in East Boston in a decade. Additional citizen-led park creation efforts are ongoing in East Boston, including airport edge buffers, Piers Park II, and the continuation of the Greenway – all of which will help implement the community's vision for open space.

EAST BOSTON A Brief History

The land that comprises East Boston was originally five distinct Boston Harbor Islands. Members of the Algonquin Nation once inhabited the ecologically rich salt marsh and estuary environment of the islands. In 1637, Noddle Island became the first neighborhood to be annexed by the City of Boston. During the 17th and 18th centuries, European settlers used the islands for farming, grazing, and military fortifications. Gradually, the islands were intentionally merged by leveling and filling. The two largest islands, Noddle and Breed (Hog Island) form what are today the residential and commercial sections of East Boston. Governor's, Apple and Bird Islands, along with Wood Island Park, were incorporated into Logan Airport.
